Conducting a search of the Argus Courier from June 1918 - March 1919 using the keywords: <flu mask>gave rise to many articles about the flu including the cause, symptoms, concerns, and politics. The paper reported numbers of cases across the country as well as information that readers could use to help them decide their own course of action. This timeline centers on those articles relating to masks and their use.

#### Setting the stage:

The war was going strong in early 1918 and signs of a pandemic style flu was being noted. By October, cities and towns all over the world were working to stop the rate of infection. Masks were one way to quell the spread.

Here is the timeline of those articles from October 1918 - March 1919. Enjoy the trip!

The first 'flu masks' in Petaluma were noted On October 22, 1918: "half a dozen passengers who alighted at the depot wore their masks and kept them on, these being the first masks to be seen on the streets of this city. In San Francisco, orders have been given that all persons who appear on the streets must wear these masks".

The Board of Health has authority under the police power of the constitution to require everybody to wear masks or carry shotguns, if the health or lives of people are endangered. It matters not about law or authority, the orders are to wear masks. Obey.

M. de Permentier, arrested by Officer Bert Masten was fined \$15. He paid five dollars into the coffers of the court and ten dollars to the Red Cross. He resented the officer's advice relative to the fine mask.

## HEALTH BOARD MEETS TONIGHT

The Health Board will meet in special session this evening and it is an oper secret that the meeting will be for the purpose of deciding on the date for discarding the flu masks and for removing the health restrictions, owing to the fact that the influenza is now greatly on the wane and is really mastered.

It is not known what course the board will take after discussing the matter but those who think that they know, believe that the board will order the removal of the masks on Saturday night when the county ordinance will also be suspended. What the board will do about

dinance will also be suspended. What the board will do about the schools, theaters, etc., is another question but it is predicted that they will be allowed to open again with the understanding that masks be worn at all indoor gatherings for a limited period as in San Francisco. Tonight will tell the tale and the whole city is anxiously awaiting the decision of the board.

# PETALUMAHAS UNMASKED AFTER MUZZLED MISERY

At the special meeting of the City Board of Health yesterday with President Gossage presiding it was decided to lift the ban and remove all restrictions which have been enforced during the epidemic of the influenza. The flu mask order was suspended and the people of the city after weeks of muzzled misery again drew a breath of real fresh air. There were no regrets when the citizens were ordered to unmask. The second invitation was not necessary.

The police efficers informed citizens and the news was soon circulated that Petaluma had unmasked. Some did not care to comply with the request and are still wear ing the muzzles.

The board authorized the opening of schools, churches., and theatres, and the holding of fraternal gatherings etc.

The board has made it compulsory off Saturday night.

Dr. Duncan stated last night that the quarantine regulations must be enforced.

Signs will be placed at the homes where patients are ill with the disease.

At Sebastopol, masks will be taken off Saturday night.

After the war ended in early November, everyone was glad to return to normal - it appeared that the flu was diminishing and schools could re-open. With some diligence, including signage to be placed in front of the homes of those ill with the flu, it was just good to be done with it.

—The Santa Rosa Health board has issued an order, compelling the wearing of flu masks in all homes where there are cases of the disease.

> By early December, flu masks were once again being mandated in San Francisco, as the flu showed it's appearance again in the larger cities.

—H. H. Oellig had business at Healdsburg on Friday and is glad that he took his flu mask with him. Starting on December 11, the Argus began reporting on the spike in flu cases across the state: Los Angeles reported 650 cases in a 24 hour period. By December 19, Napa, San Jose, Modesto, and Fresno all recorded increasing cases. Healdsburg reported an increase on Dec. 14, 1918

# SANTA ROSANTO DON MASKS

SANTA ROSA, Dec. 27.—The Santa Rosa mask ordinance goes into effect at midnight and will be rigidly enforced, as decided at a meeting of the city board of health today at the office of Dr. R. M. Bonar, city health officer.

There was some talk of closing the churches and allowing the saloons to remain open, also the rights of the theatres to continue their shows were discussed. It was decided. It was decided as a compromise to exclude children under 12 years of age from theatres and churches to close Sunday schools. Gatherings of adults, where all are masked, will be permitted, and the church be open as usual until further notice.

Cards are to be placed on homes where there are known to be cases of the "flu" and the public will be requested to keep out. We begin to see The surge in late December.

While Petaluma schools were closing, other towns began reporting fewer cases. As January wore on, Napa and Ukiah took off mask rules and opened up socializing.

San Francisco, however, still had mask rules up through Jan 22 - and were breaking them to the tune of over 100 arrests posted in the paper that day.
